Symposium on History of Indian Economic Thought

13th April 2024

The Online Symposium on the History of Indian Economic Thought, held in collaboration with the Indian Society for the History of Economic Thought (ISHET), was successful in building conversations around a marginalized field in economics - a historical perspective in economics. The speakers covered a range of topics during this 1-day symposium, including thoughts on how to incorporate various Schools of Thought in Indian economics curricula; how personal lives of famous economists have influenced their economic thought; he diversity of Indian economic thought with papers on B.R. Ambedkar, Maulana Maududi, and Dadabhai Naoroji's work on national income accounting; and even explored the discourse surrounding the evolution of pedagogy surrounding political economy in Presidency College.

The event markedly stepped away from a Euro-centricity that usually dominates the field of economics, as well as history of economic thought. It also managed to bring in approaches and thinkers in HET that lie at the margins, and put them together to build a more comprehensive and inclusive study around HET. This event was the first initiative between IDEAS and ISHET, and is the first steps to a continued engagement with ISHET in the following months in the field of research and knowledge building.

Roundtable Discussion on Understanding Lok Sabha Elections 2024



Panel 1: How May India Vote?

The panel discussion focused on understanding the previous trends and explored the possibilities of how India might vote in the upcoming Lok Sabha elections in 2024. Drawing from their academic and field experience in analysing Indian elections, the panelists engaged with various social, economic, and cultural facts that might impact the voting pattern in the elections. The diverse perspectives presented created a space for the audience to think and reflect on how the people of India might repose their faith in the current ruling party for a third term. The panelists also reflected on the role of the opposition and whether it has been able to gather support from other political allies to win the Lok Sabha elections this year. Alongside, they also reflected on the role of social media in influencing voters and creating popular opinions through social media platforms.

Panel 2: State of the Indian Economy

panel discussion successfully economy's challenges to its widest forms and suggested some focused policy changes for the new government. Prof. Majumdar elaborated on how the falling investment rate, declining share of trade to GDP, industrial stagnation, youth unemployment, and sluggish growth of bank credits are indicating some serious structural problems of the economy. M.K. Venu concurred that there were hardly any institutional changes initiated during the preceding decade to address the issues of better delivery of the schemes and reduce corruption. . He suggested comprehensive changes in the Company' Laws and other regulatory legislation to control the overall rise of shell companies. Prof. Mehrotra emphasized that since the country's demographic dividend will peak during the next 15 years, focusing on quality employment for the next generations is of primary concern for policymakers. Ms K. Sujatha Rao advocated for prioritization of healthcare provisions in government policy discourse, which has not improved despite the severe negative impact on the growth and development of the country with the COVID-19 outbreak.

Nazariya Inaugural Talk - Critical Dialogue Series

20th April 2024

Talk: Caste and Islam in South Asia: a Genealogy of Contemporary Debates

Speaker: Julien Levesque, University of Zürich

This inaugural event of *Nazariya* was organized by Politics, Society & History (PSH) constellation to discuss the larger debates on the question of caste and 'backwardness' among Muslims in contemporary India. This initiative brought more clarity to the understanding of *Pasmanda* communities and shed light on how the politics of Muslim mobilization around issues of backwardness have historically evolved. The attempt by PSH in organizing this discussion was also to see how the constellation situates their research questions in the light of presented sources, theories, and frames of analysis.

The guest speaker, Dr. Julien Levesque, examined contemporary debates on the Muslim caste in India by providing a genealogy of various categories in use. He attempted to locate the origin of these debates in several historical junctures in the colonial period. While returning to the basic question "whether a caste system existed among Muslims?", Julien analyzed a plethora of historical and anthropological research spanning two centuries to show how the current political mobilization of the Pasmanda Muslims is impacted by concepts shaped historically. This talk deepened and complicated our understanding of the present debate on caste.





Review Essay: Beyond the Binaries: Tracing the evolution of Hindu-Muslim Friendship in South Asian Intra-Muslim Discourses and Debates

After the end of Muslim political sovereignty in South Asia, how did Muslim scholars grapple with the possibilities and dangers of Hindu-Muslim friendship? How did they negotiate the incongruities between foundational texts and attitudes toward non-Muslims that were informed by the premodern context of Muslim empire and the realities of British colonialism, which rendered South Asian Muslims a political minority? In this groundbreaking book, SherAli Tareen explores how leading South Asian Muslim thinkers imagined and contested the boundaries of Hindu-Muslim friendship from the late eighteenth to the mid-twentieth centuries. He argues that often what was at stake in Muslim scholarly discourse and debates on Hindu-Muslim friendship were unresolved tensions and fissures over the place and meaning of Islam in the modern world. This book considers a range of topics, including Muslim scholarly translations of Hinduism, Hindu-Muslim theological polemics, the question of interreligious friendship in the Qur'an, intra-Muslim debates on cow sacrifice, and debates on emulating Hindu customs and habits.



Technologies of Knowledge Rethinking the Archive in Modern South Asia



Regulatory Challenges of Deepfakes in India

Also, by integrating insights from the comparative legal analysis and the effectiveness of awareness campaigns, this paper provides comprehensive recommendations that prioritize legislative advancements while also addressing the need for enhancing public awareness and understanding of the legal implications of deepfake technology.

Inclusive Governance, Developed Kurukshetra A Human Development Agenda Report for Kurukshetra District

This report lays down an action plan for overall development of Kurukshetra district of Haryana, based on an analysis of its current socio-economic conditions. The report first outlines demographic, social and economic profiling of the district, using various secondary data sources such as Census, NFHS, Statistical Abstract for Haryana, etc. It then identifies the key target areas of development, such as livelihood, health and education, based on secondary data analysis, as well as insights from field interviews. For each of these target areas, the report discusses some of critical challenges faced by the district, along with potential interventions to address them. A comparative analysis for the district is also done vis-a-vis the state of Haryana on all parameters. Lastly, based on the findings, an extensive list of short-term, medium-term, and long-term policies will be suggested towards improving the living standards of the population. This will provide a clear road map to policy makers for achieving inclusive development in the district.

Leveraging recent events, it recommends strategies for diversification, technological progress, and international partnerships to reinforce critical mineral supply chains, thereby strengthening India's defence manufacturing capabilities and fortifying national security in the face of geopolitical uncertainties.

Leveraging Brisbane Port's Success for Kolkata Port's Sustainability





The endeavour involves scrutinising the operational obstacles faced by Kolkata Port, juxtaposing them with the accomplishments of Brisbane Port, and suggesting policies focusing on upstream restoration, maintenance of river boundaries, modernisation of dredging techniques, efficient sediment disposal, and adoption of eco-friendly practices. The primary objective is to provide a practical roadmap for Kolkata Port Trust and its stakeholders to enhance efficiency, reduce costs, and promote environmental sustainability. By amalgamating lessons learned from Brisbane and tailoring solutions to suit Kolkata's distinct riverine environment, this project seeks to offer novel insights for effectively tackling port challenges.




Pan-India Stories of Informal Workers During Covid-19 Pandemic: Crisis Narratives
